Grant will improve student access to college

A network of organizations that aims to help more Sarasota County students pursue education and training beyond high school has combined \$62,500 in matching funds to secure a \$50,000 grant from Florida Philanthropic Network (FPN) for their efforts.

The local initiative, known as Talent4Tomorrow (T4T), will use the new funding to improve college access and completion rates for Sarasota area youth.

The grant will expand programs that help students access federal

and state financial aid for which they qualify.

It will also fund new efforts to inform students about high-demand local jobs and the education pathways to reach them, and help students who are traditionally underrepresented in higher education see college as a realistic and achievable opportunity.

The grant was awarded through the College Access and Success Initiative, an FPN initiative made possible through funding from The Helios Education Foundation and The Kresge Foundation.

"Our regional economy requires a pipeline of skilled workers to

meet the demands of local employers," said Mark Pritchett, president and CEO of Gulf Coast Community Foundation, which applied for the grant on behalf of the T4T partnership. "Increasingly, that means college completion, which includes two-year degrees and technical certifications."

The Charles & Margery Barancik Foundation and the Community Foundation of Sarasota County joined Gulf Coast in committing the local matching funds required by FPN's challenge grant.

"The Barancik Foundation and the Community Foundation really made this grant award possible,"
Pritchett said.

T4T leaders say the grant validates and rewards collaborative

work that has already garnered Sarasota County statewide recognition. Last year, Sarasota County Schools earned eight of 15 awards in the Florida
