CareerEdge Announces First Express Class Graduation

Workforce development non-profit CareerEdge Funders Collaborative announces the graduation of its first "express program" with 10 students completing Suncoast Technical College's Automotive Lube Technician class this week.

The program was designed in partnership with Gettel Automotive to recruit entry-level automotive technician trainees to the industry.

"It's really a win-win for the community to have CareerEdge help facilitate recruiting and training programs for critical shortage occupations like automotive technicians," explains Gettel Fixed Operations Director Fred Bartholomew.

Given the high demand for skilled workers in our region, CareerEdge Funders Collaborative is partnering with several educational institutions to provide cutting edge short-term "express" programs in order to quickly move individuals into apprenticeship-based occupations in the trades. CareerEdge is also partnering with Manatee Technical College on short-term programs for Plumbing and Electrician certifications, and with the training company Learning Alliance for a short-term Broadband Technician program.

"STC appreciates the opportunity to partner with CareerEdge to help employers with their talent needs, as well as to provide individuals with skills and credentials which allow them to earn livable wages, explains Suncoast Technical College Director Ron Dipillo.

Gettel Automotive hired all of the students at \$12 per hour for full or part-time trainee positions while they attended the free 10-week training program at the college two nights per week. Now that the participants have completed the class, they will be paid \$13 per hour full time with benefits, with the potential for additional certifications and career growth in the automotive apprenticeship program. Average wages for mechanics are between \$40,000 and \$50,000, with many earning six figures.

"CareerEdge continues to explore creative ways to help connect people to high demand career-laddering jobs while assisting employers with their workforce needs", says Executive Director Mireya Eavey.
